

ORDINANCE No. 43.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT THE KEEPING OF COMBUSTIBLE MATERIAL WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS.

Be it Ordained bt the Council of the City of Polson:

SECTION I. No person shall within the limits of the City of Polson, have or keep any hay, straw or other combustible fodder in open stack or otherwise than securely covered from fire, nor shall any owner or occupant of any premises within the city allow piles of open and broken packing boxes, paper or straw to accumulate on any portion of such premises so as to become dangerous to such or adjoining premises. Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof the offender shall be punishable by a fine in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

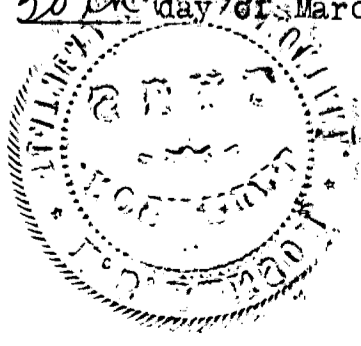
